

Supervisor and Legal Escalation Blueprint

A command blueprint for missing stations, disputed forms, variance dashboards, evidence bundles, and escalation decisions before the petition clock starts.

BUILT FOR

Aspirants, chief agents, coordinators, supervisors, and counsel

Election evidence discipline, from stream to final tally.

Command promise

This blueprint shows how the campaign should move from agent activity to command decisions without losing the chain of proof.

COMMAND DASHBOARD QUESTIONS

- Which stations are open? Which streams are missing? Which agents are active? Which areas have no turnout updates?
- Which results have been received? Which forms are uploaded? Which OCR entries need manual review? Which stations have unresolved variance?
- Which incidents are severe enough for legal escalation, and which can be resolved operationally by a supervisor?

ESCALATION TIERS

- Tier one is agent correction: missing photo, incomplete note, or unclear turnout source. The supervisor sends the agent back into the workflow.
- Tier two is operational escalation: missing stream, locked record, repeated discrepancy, or disputed result requiring chief agent attention.
- Tier three is legal escalation: violence, intimidation, form refusal, unexplained variance, denial of agent rights, or evidence that may affect a petition.

PETITION-ROOM HANDOVER

- The legal team should receive a report organized by position, ward or constituency, station, stream, timeline, evidence, and unresolved discrepancy.
- Reports should preserve original entries and version history. A corrected record is weaker if the original record disappears.
- The aspirant should be able to see, before declaration, where the campaign has proof and where it only has suspicion.

Field readiness checklist

- Coverage dashboard reviewed
- Critical incidents escalated
- Forms checked for readability
- Action log preserved
- Missing stations chased
- Variance list reviewed
- Legal report generated

Why this matters to the aspirant

The best campaign command centers do not wait for chaos to become litigation. They turn field discipline into immediate decision-making.
